# top ten live instruments/setup that turned my ears into hearts in 2008

In no particular order:

- 1. **Conure's noise pedals.** Lots of musicians in the Bay Area are doing the no-input noise pedal thing. Conure is my fave so far. He brings a sense of composition, textural detail, and restraint, floating delicately on the threshold between a "swollen" sound and feedbacky shrieks.
- 2. **Moe!'s suspended tape.** When Moe did his solo set at the "Batterie!" concert Royce Gallery, he had his drum heads

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- taped to the room's support pillar, and was rubbing the tape to get drones from the heads. Very nice!
- 3. Andy Strain & Kevin Shea Adams's

  "Painting with Trombone" setup. I've seen it at the Chapel of the Chimes and the Luggage Store. It was great both times and is constantly getting better. Kevin processes the sounds of Andy's trombone both with audio effects and visuals against a screen. Meanwhile, Andy improvises while "painting" using a LED light sensor attached to the instrument.
- 4. **Phillip Greenlief's sax.** Phillip brings a strong argument for simply knowing how to play your instrument very well, and learning how to incorporate new sounds, textures and contexts to his instrument. He's a joy to hear every time, and is probably one of the easiest musicians to group with electronic players (who are prone to focusing on multiphonics and textures).
- 5. **Keith Evans' film contraptions.** Most recently seen at *Music by the Eyeful* at Luggage Store. Keith builds unique video installations, which usually go something like this: Project archival footage of trains or bacteria-eaten film onto a rotating tin cylinder. Shine candles and flashlights on the cylinder too. Film the results with a video camera (while waving colored transparencies and other objects in front of it) and project the video camera's output to the screen that the audience sees. A perfect accompaniment for spooky texture music.
- 6. **Ben Bracken's guitars.** Such a simple idea, yet so effective: Ben brought three guitars and a cymbal to his performance at Luggage Store, with multiple amplifiers. The guitars simply sat on a stand in front of the amplifier speakers, which Ben sent signals through, to excite the strings. Mix and process the results for some lovely drones.

- 7. Tujiko Noriko how to karaoke laptop. I normally hate karaoke performances of new music. Though I'm a fan of Noriko's glitchy songs, I had a fear that she might simply hit "play" and restrict herself to singing onstage. She was clearly manipulating the sounds of her pre-recorded laptop tracks as she sung her lyrics, and then between, would smoothly transition that into much more hands-on sound manipulation that you'd expect from a laptop-only performance bringing us gracefully into a madness of digital sampler/synth blooms. After all the folding/unrolling/fizzling is complete, a quiet thank you.
- 8. Larnie Fox's Crank Ensemble. It's a privilege to be a member of this group, but I can include it here since it wasn't my idea. The Crank Ensemble features a dozen hand built crank-operated instruments, performed 6 at a time by a small guided-improv ensemble. The conductor also sits at the mixer board, so he can control levels of the instruments. The instruments feature materials like springs, rubber bands, resonating metal strips, etc., and be performed with cranking, hand plucking, smacking, etc. A surprising diversity of sounds ensues.
- 9. Daryl Shawn's lo-fi guitar manipulation.
  Instead of taking the easy way out of a laptop computer or fx pedals, Daryl manipulates the sounds of his nylon stringed guitar with a simple 4-track cassette recorder and a multispeed cassette dictaphone, producing lovely patterns swimming in analog lo-pass clipping, pitch bending and dropouts.
- 10. Kevin Spears' electric kalimbas. Kevin made us all clap hands for way too long at the Santa Cruz Live Looping Festival, but he delivered a memorably rockin' set using 3 different contact mic'ed kalimbas, with an array of guitar pedals. ❖
